NOVEMBER 27, 2018 SPEAKER REVIEW

Our luncheon speaker this month, Davis Perkins, is a man of many talents, interests, and accomplishments. It would be impossible to list them all here, so I'll just mention the things that most caught my attention. Davis' life-long passion has been painting. He has Fine Arts degrees from the University of Oregon and the Pacific Northwest School of Art in Portland. His paintings hang in at least eight museum collections including the Smithsonian, the Alaska State Museum, the Pentagon, and the University of Oregon in Eugene. You can view many of his paintings on his website: http://DavisPerkins.com. You won't be disappointed! He refers to himself as a landscape painter, but he also is keen on aviation, so you'll find quite a few paintings of airplanes.

Which brings us to smoke jumping. Davis worked thirteen summers as a smokejumper after serving as a paratroop sergeant with the Army's 82nd Airborne Division and the 12th Special Forces Group of the Army Reserve. Davis says that smoke jumping has been a big influence on his life, and that's easy to believe. It's extremely difficult to be accepted into this profession. Only about 50% of applicants make it through training, says Davis, and "it's tougher than the military." A smokejumper article in Wikipedia puts it this way: "Bases tend to look for highly motivated individuals who are in superior shape and have the ability to think independently and react to changing environments rapidly." That's probably why there are only four or five hundred smokejumpers in the United States. You'll find them primarily in Montana, Idaho, Washington, Oregon, and Alaska, but they will jump wherever they are needed. Davis no longer jumps, but he did put in volunteer time at the recent Camp Fire in Northern California.

Sometime along the way Davis became a paramedic, and he remains active in that field and as a member of the Disaster Medical Assistance Team of the Department of Health and Human Services. From about 2010 to the present, Davis has served on medical relief missions to Haiti, Ethiopia, Cambodia, Liberia, Vanuatu, Nepal, Greece, and Mosul Iraq. In these places, he helps to set up treatment units and clinics, the goal being, as he puts it, "to establish stabilization points and to keep people alive." Davis is pretty modest about what he does and what he has done, but he did suggest that these medical teams have saved a lot of lives.

I get the idea from his talk and the slides he showed us of smokejumpers and paramedics that while his primary focus at the present is landscape painting, if his phone rings and someone asks him to jump out of a plane into a fire or leave tomorrow morning to help people in Mosul, he would say YES!

Thank you, Davis, for sharing so much of your life with us.


Some issues:
