#### Galen Durham- Feb. 25,2020 Speaker Review

BACKGROUND: Galen Durham is a 35-year Member of National Civil War Association (NCWA), the first and largest Civil War Assn. west of the Mississippi, which reenacts Civil War Battles for the public. For 20 years, Galen has been providing Civil War presentations to schools, libraries, and civic organizations. Galen spoke on the following topics:

The Civil War was considered to be the first "modern war' as it was the first to use telegraph for communications, hot air balloons, photography, weapons with riffling, metal-hulled ships, submarines, field hospitals and triage centers..

The soldiers were in camps roughly 9 months a year, but were required to relocate, to build new sites, move equipment, etc. The **bayonet** was rarely used in hand-to-hand combat, but used more as a universal tool e.g. as a BBQ skewer for cooking raw meat, a main part of th

eir ration. The soldiers generally were given meals and 3 hard tack biscuits a day. Although the hard tack has been given a "bad rap", the men saved them for snacks when traveling until the next meal came.

Calvary vs. Infantry. The Calvary wore jackets vs. the long length coats used by the infantry. The infantry had only one rifle with a bayonet, whereas the Calvary had three weapons (a saber, a Colt 44 caliber revolver with six chambers, and a Sharp carbine which fired 5 times as fast as what the infantry had. (Note the Cavalryman had to purchase his own Sharp carbine.) The Calvary were used mostly for observation, but were also used as reinforcements, by dismounting to fight in battle. Because the horses were small and had to carry much weight, the Cavalrymen needed to be smaller men.

Injuries were generally of two types - those you "live through" like injuries to the arms or legs vs. those you "die from" like injuries to the head or body. As such, the surgeons would treat the arm / leg wounds first maybe with amputation, but these soldiers generally lived. The latter were often left in the field of battle, generally without treatment to die. So you might find this group huddled under the shade of a tree to escape the Southern heat. Both Union and Confederate troops may have huddled together in their last moments of life.

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Women's contribution to the war effort was significant as they made the uniforms, ammunition and preformed nursing. They also hand cut, numbered and dated the money needed to support the war. A few women did fight with the men. But when discovered, they were sent right back home

The soldiers' haversack may have a sewing kit called a "House Wife", a prayer book, a picture or letter from home, and some money to use a needed.

The Battle of New Market or "Battle of Lost Shoes" occurred between 147 VMI students and Union troops in this Civil War battle. Volunteering for battle when there were no Confederate troops to fight, the students lined up, fired their rifles and then charged the Union troops with bayonets. As they ran through a muddy field, most lost their shoes in the mud. When the Union soldiers realized that they were just fighting students, the Union retreated. Hence, the VMI students were declared the winners and the legend of the Battle of Lost Shoes became history.
